very year, the Club's National Feast of Lanterns becomes a showcase for the Club and indeed camping and caravanning in general.

We invite many members of the national and local media along to enjoy the event although many of them will never have been in a modern caravan. Last year it

was an even more important event, our Centenary, and it attracted more press and TV than usual so we decided to go for the ultimate hospitality unit – the Rolls Royce of caravans – the Carlight Commander.

It was the right decision. Our reporters and television producers were certainly impressed with design and build quality, but mostly with that indefinable "I didn't think caravanning was as luxurious as this."

The dedicated Wedgwood china helped – just £468 extra, but that does include the teapot. Engraved glasses, too, gave an upmarket air (£202). But the largest gasps came when

we mentioned the price. You could probably buy a reasonable curry with your change from £30,000.

As you would expect from Carlight, outside and inside styling was restrained but elegant. Construction was old-fashioned but none the worse for that. Some journalists positively clucked with delight over the dovetailed drawers. The end shower room offered a huge wardrobe and a luxury circular shower. We enthusiasts tutted at the electric flush toilet that draws water from the internal and external tanks. What a waste.

Those more experienced caravanners who came to look at the Commander were more impressed with things

you need (left), easily
reached and labelled

water tank fill point;
and there is a large
bore waste pipe
ready to empty into
the wheel away
waste tank that
comes with the
vehicle.

The huge bed was comfortable, once you had worked out how to make it up, everything fell easily to hand in the kitchen (left), but best of all, this was an ideal, comfortable

sitting room to share a gin and tonic with the lady from the BBC and to convince her what a great thing caravanning today really is.
